
## Setting triangles for quilt blocks turned on point




This is the square that will produce the side triangles for your quilt. Each square will produce 4 side triangles, so determine how many you will need by the numbers of rows in your quilt. You may have some extras leftover.

The outside or long edge of the triangle will be on the straight grain of the fabric, which will help stabilize your quilt. The short edges of the triangle will be bias edges, but will be stabilized by being sewn to the straight edge of the block pieced next to it.

You will determine the size of this square by measuring the DIAGONAL of your pieced block and adding 3 inches. Cut this square through each diagonal to make 4 triangles. Handle carefully, they are bias edged!

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This square will produce the corner triangles for your quilt. You will need TWO squares to make the 4 corner triangles.

The outside edges of the triangle will be on the straight grain of the fabric, which will help stabilize your quilt. The long edge of the triangle will be bias, but will be stabilized by the straight edge of the block pieced next to it.

You will determine the size to cut this square by measuring the pieced block along one OUTSIDE edge and adding 3 inches.

Too make the triangles, cut the resulting square ONCE on the diagona
