
Ok, this picture shows your foundation paper with a yellow frame around

it...only because it is easier to see the edges in the pictures... I have

marked where the actual block is.




Are you ready to start??? Turn the paper over and dab a bit of glue in

the center lightly lay your square right side up, pick this up, hold it up to

a light, can you see the square's outline?? Is there at least a $\frac{1}{4}$ " of fabric


all of the way around it? If yes, make sure it is glued down well enough to

stay put. Don't over glue though! On to the next step!!!



Now we will cut down the fabric to the ¼" seam allowance. Looking at the front of the paper, the line between piece 1 and 2 is the one we want to fold. Place your cardboard, on that line and fold the top of the paper downward. Take your ruler and measure your ¼" seam allowance and make the cut on the fabric sticking out Repeat these 2 steps all around the center square, following the number sequence.





This is what the block will look like from the back when you are done with this step.




Now we are ready to add the next 4 pieces onto the square. Take piece 2 and put it on the fabric square right sides together. Try to center it a little better than I did LOL



Turn the paper over while holding onto the fabric, hold it up to the light to check that you are still lined up and that the wings are fairly even on either side of the square.

When that is done, place one pin in the right side, well away from the sewing line between piece 1 and 2.



You will sew on that line between the 2 pieces between the dots I marked. Set your stitch length to 1.8 and start sewing one stitch before the intersecting lines, and finish sewing one stitch after the intersecting lines. These stitches won't show in the seam lines, and are what gives you those awesome crisp points!!!! I cut the threads leaving a ¼" tail, that helps keep the stitches from pulling out.

When you are done stitching this seam, lay the paper right side up, fold the paper in that seam line down, and trim the seam allowance again to ¼" if the second piece got a little wonky...I don't get really picky here, if it is within a few threads, I leave them...but maybe not for blocks swaps LOL



Now take this to the iron and press this piece open. Do not use steam, it may look nicer, but it will shrink the paper! This is what you should see now.
